

General:

### **Flute**

Overblow. Overblow extremely, resulting in a piercing, whistling sound reminding the viola sul ponticello sound.

Shout 'n' play. Shout while playing (pitch ad lib). This is intended to result in a distorted sound.

**Inhale/exhale panting**. Finger the note, cover the mouthipiece with your mouth and breath heavily and aggressively into the pipe according to the notated rhythm. This way of playing is intended to sound in panting, animal-like sound.

Jeté with flt. Combination of fluttertongue and diaphragm staccato.

Tongue pizz. A special staccato produced with slapping the tongue, producing a perky, snappy, overarticulated attack.

**Flageolet**. A special pale or white sound achieved by fingering and octave below (or in some cases another partial below the notated pitch) and then overblowing to sound the desired note.
