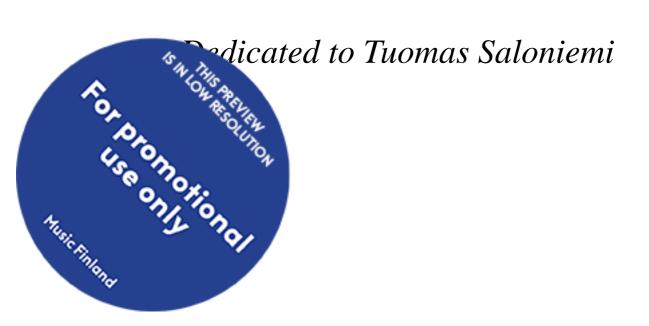

#### About the piece, its background and its character.

It was autum 2007 when I first met Tuomas Saloniemi in a student cafeteria. He found out that I was a composer and immediately ask me to write a solo tuba piece for him.

In 2012, I served as the last chairperson of Sibelius Academy Student Union. That year I gave many speeches and my attention was naturally drawn to art of rhetoric and its relationship to music. The humoristic and provocative communication style of Tuomas, my predecessor, brought me the idea of writing a solo tuba piece that would be a political speech.

After many sketches, drafts and versions, The President's Speech was premiered in November 2013. Tuomas played it also in his master's recital ("A") the next week. I immediately felt that the piece needed some cutting, but it wasn't until spring 2015 when I finally did the hard 'kill your darlings' job.

As it exists now, The President's Speech is a fictional State of the World speech. It's a bit of me, bit of Tuomas. Actually a bit of Bernie Sanders, even if I knew nothing of him by the time of composition. But mostly, it's just a never held speech that the world needs. The radical content is idealistic and let's-face-the-facts in the same time, despite the noble and a slightly pompous circumstances. Strong pathos, strong ethos, strong message. Anyone who dares to give it takes a big risk of never being elected again.

The actual material employs some Finnish words and phrases. They serve both as semantically meaningful signals and symbols and as phonetic material, used as any esthetically perceived sound. The rhetorical arch of the piece is not based (any more) on any particular speech but follows its own, musical logic. Any questions concerning the poetics of the piece are welcome.

#### **NOTA**

#### Tempo and metre.

The accuracy of tempo alternates between the two extremes of:

thm; time signatures, metronome marks, barlines, and beamed notes given; and without time signatures or beams, only black or white noteheads signifying verses, commas and (ad lib.) tempo given.

either option are played with a rubato of some degree.

voiced (only air noise). The written pitch must not to be heard.

#### Spoken or played?

Played passages are written with noteheads. When bracketed words are given, the passage should be played as if it were spoken.

Spoken passages are written without noteheads. The words are written without brackets and should be spoken through the instrument. Some intonation advice is notated by the position of missing noteheads.

#### Words given are Finnish. See pronunciation instructions on the internet.

#### Articulation and tonguing.

Four degrees of tounguing sharpness are distinguished, marked with capital letters above the staff, from the sharpest to softest:

T sharp tongue (also "K" when double or triple) D (also "G" when double or triple) medium (normal) tongue L soft tongue

The sharpness of tounguing should be independent of the staccato-tenuto aspect of articulation (detached or bound), that is marked with common staccato, legato and tenuto signs.

N.B.! possible also after a rest

) means that the airflow is blocked by the tongue A horizontal bracket on the top of a rest ( during the whole length of the rest, as in finnish geminate plosives. The player must not breath or otherwise relax during this kind of rest.

Flutter tongue is written with "Z" across the stem or on the top of the notehead. A fluttered note should not be attacked with a sharp tongue (T) unless specifically asked for.

#### Timbre and vowels.

The pieces employs two extremes of the shape of the oral cavity, resulting opposite tone colours, and the glissandi between them:

narrow, tight cavity as in vowels [i, y] sharp and edgy, overtone-rich timbre

 $\Box$ wide, loose cavity as in vowels [a, o] mellow and round

gradually from narrow to wide
