Full Hands for flute and string quartet (2011)

To the performers:

Full Hands is based on quided modular transformative improvisation.

This means that you are given modules which contain ideas of different types of music, as starting points for improvisation. The modules are divided into fast ideas and slow ideas. In this piece, the goal in improvising is to play individually, but at the same time interact with each other. Listen! Please do not simply play through these modules one after another, but instead use them as seed water for inventing music. The only exception is the ending, which is to be played as written.

Usage of the modules:

Pages 4, 5 and 6 are to be folded out for the performance.

Begin the piece with the module "S T A R T".

Then choose freely two modules and make music with them, letting the ideas have an effect on each other. There does not need to be clear boundaries between the two modules: the alternation, discussion or advice between the modules can also be quite fast. At any point you can change either one or both of the modules. Not necessarily all the modules need to be played in one performance.

Finish the piece with the module "E N D", to be played as written, everyone together in tempo.

If you get distracted, which may sometimes happen in improvisation, do not panic, but just return to one of the modules, then choose a pair for it and continue!

On top of that, there are playing technique ideas given, which can be applied into any of the given modules at any point. Not necessarily all the playing techiques need to be used in one performance.

The duration of the piece is ca. 10 min.

EXPLANATIONS OF THE PLAYING TECHNIQUES

Overblow. Overblow extremely, resulting in a piercing, whistling sound reminding the viola sul ponticello sound.

Shout 'n' play. Shout while playing (pitch ad lib). This is intended to result in a distorted sound.

Inhale/exhale panting. Finger the note, cover the mouthipiece with your mouth and breath heavily and aggressively into the pipe according to the notated rhythm. This way of playing is intended to sound in panting, a nimal-like sound.

Jeté with flt. Combination of fluttertongue and diaphragm staccato.

Tongue pizz. A special staccato produced with slapping the tongue, producing a perky, snappy, overarticulated attack.

Flageolet. A special pale or white sound achieved by fingering and octave below (or in some cases another partial below the notated pitch) and then overblowing to sound the desired note.

aking flute. Whisper words into the instrument and simultaneously finger melodic lines.
