
# SIDEMAN


FOR PERCUSSION AND TAPE



I have always had a great admiration for machines. One of my fondest memories as a young aspiring percussionist was the the time I spent standing in the doorway of the lounge at a bowling alley where my parents were defending the company's honour. What intrigued me so much was the lounge band that played from Thursday through Saturday. The group consisted of an organ and a trumpet...that was it. Well, not exactly, because when it came time to play the Latin set, the trumpet player used a maraca pedal. For those of you who don't know what that is, the maraca pedal was a bass drum pedal with two maracas attached to it, one slanting forward and one backwards. As you pressed the pedal down the maracas changed position creating a sound similiar to rustling a bag of hard candy in a movie theatre. However I was fascinated by the ensemble and spent most of the evening listenng to them. Imagine then my amazement when one evening as I approached the doorway and heard the most wonderful array of percussion sounds. At first I thought that the trumpet player had grown ten more legs, but search as I may I could'n see any percussion instruments. It was only when the piece ended and I heard a three and one third measure percussion solo as the organist groped around the side of the organ to find the button and make the solo stop. And then I saw it, the SIDEMAN. It was a revolution. Here was a drummer that had twenty hands, who could play at unbelievable tempos, whose hands never tired, whose tempos never varied, who could play louder or softer than any of us mere mortals. And on top of this everything was played with absolutely no musicality what so ever! How could anyone resist such inventions? This piece then is a small token of homage to the original SIDEMAN and all the machines that followed. May they someday learn to rush and drag and break sticks and heads like the rest of us.

### KEY TO THE SYMBOLS





 $\Psi$  = with brushes

† = with sticks

= draging the brush in a circular motion around the head

It is possible to use a drum set to perform the piece. A workable set-up has been drawn. In order to assure that the balance between the percussion and the tape is correct, one or two overhead mikes should be used on the percussion instruments. A person will be needed to mix the tape and percussion together so that their sound blend together.
