The piece is written for the 1957 Marcussen organ of the Nicolaikerk in Utrecht, the Baroque organ of the Viitasari church (Kangasalan Urkurakentamo 1989), and the 1864 Cavaillé-Coll of the L'abbaye de Royaumont. All the sounds used in the piece have been generated with these organs, and then sampled onto a computer for simultaneous use. Thus only the organ of the concert venue is being played live, together with a stereophonic tape part containing the parts for the other two instruments, as performed by computer. The tape part (2.1) consists only of the sound of these organs, with the exception of a short Indian monsoon storm near the very end.

For a possible performance outside of these three venues, the performer must choose an organ similar to one of these organs – which might be borderline impossible due to the extremely specific sounds requested by the score. Playing the piece with very different timbres is not recommended.

Description of the specific half-stopped sounds:

#### Royaumont

III (*Grand orgue*): Flûte Harmonique 8' (half) + Flûte Douce 8' (half)

The sound starts to erode from the third C upwards, turning into airy, noisy and in some cases overblown-sounding. Find the sound beforehand, no other sounds are used on III.

II (*Positif*): Flûte Harmonique 8' (half) + Picolo 1' (half)

Range: third G to fifth (highest) C#. At the same time electronic-sounding and air noise -filled. Find the sound beforehand and make sure the Flûte Harmonique will work on its own as requested in the next sound. Demonstration: <http://tinyurl.com/RoyIIa>

II (*Positif*): Flûte Harmonique 8' (half)

Range: third G to fifth (highest) C#. Lot of air noise, closely resembling a flute played with a lot of air and overblown. When preparing the sound beforehand, take notice of the area between C and E. Demonstration: <http://tinyurl.com/RoyIIb>

#### Utrecht

III (Hovodverk): Principal 8' (half) + Rørflojte 8' (half) + Spidsflojte 4' (half)

Range: third Bb to fourth F (a fifth). The desired sound is at the same time electronic and noisy. It is advisable to learn a way to prepare this sound silently, ie. by using some sort of markers on the stops, as this sound cannot be prepared beforehand due to other activity on the III. Viitasari

I: Kvint 2 2/3' (half) + Oktava 2' (half) + 1 4/5' (half)

The overall sound is quite electronic ("modulated"), with adjacent keys transposing differently, especially in the low register. In the highest register the sound almost disappears into air noise. Octaves have an electronic, "bleeding," feedback-like quality. Prepare this sound beforehand. Demonstration <http://tinyurl.com/ViitI>

II: Suavial 8' (half) + Gedakt 8' (half) + Dulcian 8' (half)

In this sound, every octave is different. Lowest octave has audible beating ("two instruments out of tune"), the second octave has surprising nasal accents on some keys, the third octave has this nasalness pronounced on top of a "hovering" background (fast beatings), the fourth octave has a quiet, second tone clearly out of tune. Ped: Subbass 16' (half)

This sound has a heavy air sound added to the sound of the stop. Prepare beforehand by finding the spot where the air sound is most pronounced while still having pitch (although quite veiled). Demonstration <http://tinyurl.com/ViitPed>

I: Rohrflöte 8' + Principal 8' + Spitzflöte 4' + Oktava 2' + Mixtur 4x (all air noise)

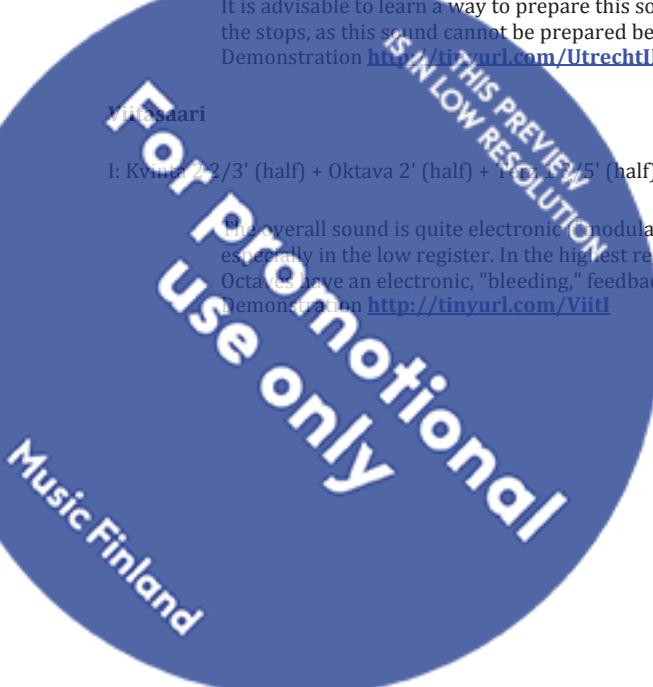
This sound will be prepared (audibly!) during the course of the piece, in mm. 97–114 (5'49"– 6'57"). The goal is to find the loudest sound, consisting only of air noise, in the second octave (played as a cluster). Some practise is recommended, although the sounding result must resemble an exploration, as if showing the listener "what's under the hood," ie. how the piece has been constructed.

II: Suavial 8' + Gedakt 8' + Principal 4' + Waldflöte 2' + Dulcian 8' (all air noise)

Similar to the previous sound (maximal air noise in the second octave cluster), this sound must be practised by the assistant to do silently during mm. 101–115 / 6'05"– 7'01" (use of marks on the stops is recommended). The first octave will have some amount of pitch left (a low and a high tone simultaneously, sounding a bit like double bass harmonics), while the third octave is completely mute.

Ped: Subbass 16' (air noise)

Likewise to be prepared by the assistant silently during the course of the piece (mm. 101–115 / 6'05"– 7'01"). Maximal air sound between the first F and the first B (played as a cluster).
